MP GIFTING PROGRAM OCTOBER 2015

Mark Brown, MP for Takuvaine and Tutakimoa, has taken a step towards making roads and homes safer in preparation for the current cyclone season. A grant from the Cook Foundation was used to purchase a new pole trimmer, enabling the road clean-up projects for that area to trim branches too high for a chainsaw to reach.

Overhanging branches and trees in close proximity to power lines can always present a danger for cars and homes underneath, especially in the event of strong winds or a cyclone. Such hazardous trees were identified in the village and around homes for the tree-trimming program to target. With the aid of the pole trimmer, the beautification work in the village was made easier and safer. The village has also entered into the Vaka Pride competition organised by Cook Islands Tourism. This is not the first project that MP Brown has initiated with the Cook Foundation. The local MP has been working hard to ensure that these valuable funds provided from the Cook Foundation can be utilised to help with the needs of the community. The last project that was funded by the foundation enabled the community to purchase 1200 metres of rope in order to assist village households to secure their homes as a precaution during cyclone season.





Mark Brown is the vice president of the Cook Islands party and the member of Parliament for the villages of Takuvaine / Tutakimoa which are situated at the back of the town centre of Avarua, Rarotonga, Cook Islands. The constituency is made up of approximately 500 voters and their families.

Aitutaki School inspires others with assistance from the Cook Foundation

Aitutaki's Araura College has made an exerted effort to become the first and only school in Cook Islands to make a 100% commitment to stop burning rubbish. With the school's strong emphasis on environmental protection, it was of great importance that the school be represented at the national environmental showcase Lagoon Day held on the 22nd-23rd October in Rarotonga. The school's principal Tracey Spiers reached out to the Cook Foundation, receiving a \$2000 grant to assist with the airfares for herself, a fellow teacher and 11 students from Araura's "Enviro Squad".

This is the first time that a school from Aitutaki has been represented at Lagoon Day, and hopefully will not be the last. The costly airfares were definitely worthwhile, with the school's "Enviro Squad" providing the public with an outstanding and inspiring example of what young people can do to help protect their environment. The Araura College Enviro Squad has been engaging in scientific research, finding creative ways to contribute to the protection of Aitutaki's land and precious lagoon.





Araura College is a state funded school on the island of Aitutaki and was first established as Aitutaki Junior High School in 1963. It has a student roll of about 190 students.

The Environ Squad is an effort by the students of Araura College to make a change and to educate the community in how to care for the environment that they live in. The students have also created a Facebook page where you can view their projects and more stories at
